Last year, I met the owner, Mr. Sullivan. When I mentioned FinnFunn, he quickly jumped in, "Yes, I remember Anita and Jack—especially Jack." And it was Jack who had suggested the sauna to Mr. Sullivan, who promptly built a small sauna in each locker room.

In the last year, the original sauna was replaced with a larger sauna in three sections: one for each gender and a spacious code area. The sections are lined with wood, releasing a sweet fragrance as the sauna heat increases. The middle section has a private area for all genders. This includes a great stowe which provides big heat and big steam...So, I might have thrown lots of water on the stones which frove a woman out the door. We finns can champion the heat!

Finnish American Heritage Society Scholarship – 2024 Application Procedure and Form

The Finnish American Heritage Society (PAHS) Scholarship Fund began in November 2000. Since then, scholarships have been anwarded to forty-three students who are motivated to support the mission (purpose) of FAHS. The FAHS By-Laws state that: "the purpose of the Society is to encourage members and others in the community in learning, collecting, preserving, and enloying the Finnish-American traditions, customs, history, and cultural heritage. The society desires to promote better awareness and appreciation of Finnish contributions to American High, past and present, as well as Finnish contributions to the world."

The primary intent of the Scholarship is to perpetuate Finnish American heritage through support of relevant educational initiatives. These can be related to, but not limited to music, the arts, health, education, the environment, architecture, or regimering.

The Scholarship Committee does not discriminate based on age, gender, ethnicity, nationality, belief, or any other conditions. Scholarships are awarded annually. Fall's gently appreciates ongoing donations to the Scholarship Fund, to ensure it will continue "in perpetuity". The current fund balance is over \$30,000. The committee invites candidates to apply, with the dealline of April 30, 20/24. Notification of recipients will be by June 30. The awards will be presented in the full. Members of Fall's and their families are eligible. Anyone who has been awarded a scholarship is added to wait at least a year before re-applying, to give others a turn.

Collection Management Committee News

The FAHS Museum is now closed for the season and will reopen in May. During the winter and early spring months the museum will be open during meetings and events and by appointment. The Collection Management

Committee (CMC) will continue to work on projects at the museum during the winter months, usually on Wednesdays,

The CMC hosted the staff from The Last Green Valley (TLGV) on Wednesday, November 1. FAHS is a nonprofit member of The Last Green Valley, which was designated by Congress as a 35-town National Heritage Corridor in eastern Connecticut and southcontrol Marcachusotts Trustee Stan Karro and the committee provided a luncheon for

the group and gave TLGV staff members a tour of the museum. Discussion during lunch revolved around how FAHS can collaborate with TLGV in the future and the difficulty of attracting young people to join nonprofit organizations.



The CMC hosted a home-school group in collaboration with the Canterbury Public Library on Tuesday, November 28. Each member of the CMC assisted with a part of the visit. Patti Folsom greeted the group in the main hall and gave an introduction to Finland, Finnish immigration, and the Finnish Hall. Anita Smiley showed slides of Finland and

provided the students with a general background on Finnish traditions and culture. Kaz Kozlowski provided an overview of the museum and discussed the theme "What We Bring with Us." Inside the museum. Kaz pointed out exhibit items such as the birchbark backpack and birchbark shoes and their connection to nature. Anita then discussed the community and arts displays, focusing on talkoot (collective mutual assistance), the sauna ritual, the Finnish coffee table, Finnish design, and Finnish music.

Katrina Bousquet brought the group to the designated Children's Corner of the museum and discussed the popularity of Moomins (a series of characters appearing in the children's books by Finnish artist and author Toye Jansson) in Finland. Katrina also demonstrated a Finnish weaving project on a small table loom.

After their tour, students were invited to make a pinecone tonttu under the direction of Kerttu Lavallee. The children and their guardians were very appreciative of the tour and Finnish-themed craft. The CMC hopes to partner again with the home-school group for another tour and activity in the spring.

The Minutes Translation from "Canterburi Grünin Haalilla 1929-1931" by Nelly Irmeli Taipale Eyke and Minna Waters

Have you ever wondered how Finnish immigrants in the Canterbury area entertained themselves in the late 1920's? Clearly televisions, iPhones, and especially TikTok didn't exist. Life was simpler back then, and perhaps, one could argue, better than it is today....and definitely not as stressful. Twenty months of minutes discovered in the Finnish Hall Archives were read, re-read and translated which uncovered an active group of Finns who held regular meetings, hosted multiple dances, theater performances and donated to a variety of causes. Upon receiving the 169-page photo-copied composition book filled with meeting minutes.



I spent pearly a year translating the Finnish written words into English. Although the handwriting changed from secretary to secretary and abbreviations were sometimes difficult to interpret (and one still a mystery), the task was completed What I learned was that many of the Finnish immigrants

were hardworking farmers who generously donated to several groups that were not only local, but also to a few out-of-state organizations that were in need of money. They enjoyed planning social events on a monthly basis and one mysterious acronym was repeated that we are asking our readers for assistance with.

Following this brief commentary is also a one-page document that my daughter. Minna Waters, summarized from my twenty-nine pages of typed translations, In that document you will find additional details. If anyone is interested in reading the entire translation of minutes, please reach out to Minna Waters at minna.waters@gmail.com.

Now for the mysterious acronym: T.U.K. The secretary, whose name was A. Anderson would start his meeting notes with "property of T.U.K." or "minutes of T.U.K." If anyone knows what this would stand for, please reach out to me. Minna. or any board member

This journey with the Finnish American Heritage Society of Canterbury was a privilege to be a part of, and I was honored to complete this translation.

Twenty-five parties were planned during the thirtysix association meetings.

Four theater performances occurred: Summer Widowers, Camp Fire, Housebreaker Victims, and Life in the Night.

Revenue generated from their party / dance / theater entrance fees, which were typically .25¢ or .35¢ per person, were shared with entities such as: prisoners of the war, strikers at Finnish ports, a local community college. Chicago headquarters, and the striking knitters.

Finlandia Foundation National

Finlandia Foundation National (FFN) reports raising 2.3 million dollars (75% of the 3-million-dollar goal) by the end of the year. FANS is listed in a chapter thank-you notice. FFN now owns the Finnish American Heritage Center and the North Wind Books store in Hancock, Michigan. The two buildings were formerly a part of Finlandia University. The purchase is the next step in FFN's mission to preserve the Finnish cultural institutions that faced an uncertain future when the school announced its closure in March 2023.



The American Finnish Club of Lake Worth, Florida (known in the community as Kerhotolo) presented aglif of \$1 million to Finlandia Foundation National on January 11, 2024. The monumental donation is the cornerstone contribution in the <u>Savina Finland in America campain</u> launched in 2023 to preserve and protect the historical and cultural assets of the Finnish American Heritage Center in Hancock, Michigan.





Aki Kaurismaki, Finland's most famous film director, does indeed like dogs; so much so that he has included a dog in each of the 20 films he has made, including his latest, Fallen Leaves. The quotation above reflects the view of the world that he has brought to his film work. Although he may "not care for mankind so much," he has put much effort into exploring the followirracies of human relationships:

Fallen Leaves has received considerable recognition and numerous accolades since it was issued in late 2023. Its two human stars are Alma Pöysti and Jussi Vatanen. Aki Kaurismaki's personal dog has an important role in the film as well and has the same name as the film's female co-star: Alma.

Follen Leowes received an award for the Best Non-English Film of 2023 from the National Society of Film Critic USA. It was nominated for two Golden Globe awards. Alma Polysti was nominated for the Golden Globe in the category of Best Performance by a Female Actor in a Musical or Comedy (this was the first time a Finnish actress was nominated for this category, and the first time for a Finnish film). Ermas Stone ultimately won the award for her role in Poor Things. The film premiered at the Cannes Film Festival and was awarded a Jury Prize by the Festival in May 2023. It later won the Figures Grond Priz, best film of 2023 and the stone of the Poor Shings.

The film is one of the most accessible of Kaurismaki's repertorire (several of his films have been shown at the Finnish American Heritage Society). It is a simple, straightforward romantic commely but droll and sustree in the Kaurismaki style. Occurring in modern-day Finland, (reference is made to the Russian invasion of Ukraine), the two main characters are Ansa (Pöysti) and Holappa (Vatanen). She is a "stock girl" in a grocery store who is fired for steeling a pre-packaged and expired) sandwich. (Time: Nor 17, 2023). She then moves on to a job washing glasses in a decrepit kranche but (the aptty named California Bar, with a sunny exterior and gloomy interior) where she meets Holappa, a metalworker at a construction stee, an alcoholic, for which he loses his lob the smokes a lob, tool, two working-class speepole in Helsinisi.

was selected by Time magazine as the best movie of the year. It was Finland's most-watched feature film (YLE News).

The courthip of Ansa and Holappa reveals two lonely people searching for happiness; Holappa trying to rise above his chronic alcoholism and isolated Alma via the adoption of a stray dog. Film reviewers have characterized the film as "dour" but also, in the Kaurismaki way, showing dry, "droll deadpan humor" that is ultimately "uplifting" and a real "feelecood" movie and "an understated charmer of a film." (Ide. Dec. 2, 2023)

Kaursmaki made Follen Leaves six years after he said he was retiring from making films. The film "has been labelled a belated fourth installment of his Proletariat Trilogy, which consists of Shadows of Paradise (1986), Ariel (1988) and The Match Factory Girl (1990)." (Concannon. Nov 28, 2023).

On the viewing end of his love of film, Kaurismaki owns, with Mika Latt, the Cinema Kino Laika in Karkkila, a town of 9000 about an hour from Helsinik; Kaurismaki and Latth have been residents of this town for Gecalest [Viariety, 2023].

**Located in an old factory hall, Laika welcomes all, including the workers from the next-door foundry" as well as the "culture people" from Helsinik. It is a dog-friendly cinema as well and severs onn-alcoholic beer for dogs. Kaurismak, in a review for Variety, has noted that they have always had dogs there. "Without dogs, your home is empty, in films, they steal the show."
